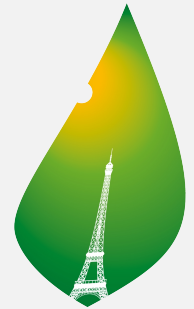

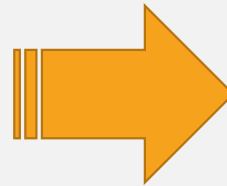

- Structure of the SDGs
 - **17 Goals** = 17 Topics of sustainable development
- **169 Targets**** = The targets identify scope of each SDG. This is details and content of the SDGs
- **232 Indicators** = To measure progress of the SDG targets. Metadata of some indicators have not been specified. Most indicators reflect only some aspects of the targets.

Significantly increase the exports of developing countries, in particular with a view to doubling the least developed countries' share of global exports by 2020

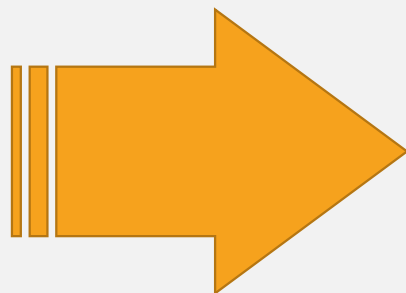
